

A Message From the Diaconate

Are You Rooting for

Let's begin with a totally unrelated riddle: What is another name for a contortionist in the Philippines? (Answer given later, but there is a clue in the article.)

Tim Tebow, arguably the greatest collegiate football star of this generation, is now playing the outfield for a low-level minor league affiliate of the New York Mets. Tim is 29 years-old and had not played any organized baseball since high school. I'll get back to his baseball career later as initially I want to look at his football career and why no team will employ him.

Despite his collegiate accomplishments, there were many doubters regarding how Tim's skills would transfer to the professional level. He became the starting quarterback in his second season with the Denver Broncos. At the time Denver had a 1-4 record. Despite not putting up gaudy statistics, Tebow had this penchant for winning games with last minute rallies. He led Denver to the playoffs and even recorded a playoff victory over our beloved Pittsburgh Steelers. A young quarterback who takes over a struggling team and leads them to the playoffs is generally in line for a lucrative new contract. Instead Tim never started another game, only played sparingly in a few games, and was out of the league a year later? Odd but true.

When something like that happens, there is usually a story behind the player's release, either legal problems or, too often, drugs. Tim was just the opposite. He was too good of a person. He was a devout Christian. He would kneel, look to the heavens, and pray in the end zone after scoring a touchdown (a practice that mockingly became known as Tebowing). Like many players, he

used black eye shadow to reduce glare, except Tim would script Biblical verses into the eye-shadow - a practice later outlawed. He openly talked about saving his virginity until after he would get married. He came by his faith honestly. His parents were Baptist missionaries in the Phillippines. Tim was the youngest of five children and was actually born in Manila in 1997.



Tim's birth is a story in itself. While pregnant with him, his mother contracted an amoebic dysentery and was in a coma for some time. Doctors expected Tim would be stillborn and they recommended an abortion. Because of their faith, the parents would not agree to an abortion, so Tim, their "miracle baby", was born. He was not only healthy, but became an amazing athlete.

Whether or not Tim Tebow should be a starting NFL quarterback is a question I'm not qualified to answer. Frankly the answer is probably *no*, but the way he was unceremoniously bounced from the league is neither normal nor right. It certainly appears he was cut because teams did not want to deal with any distractions that may arise from his faith. A young quarterback with a win-

ning record (and a playoff win to boot) should at the very least be on a roster. He could probably hire a hot shot lawyer and make a strong discrimination case, but that's not Tim Tebow.

Instead, he took a job as a TV football analyst. I'm sure he was well paid, but Tim still had that desire to compete, so recently he decided to give baseball a try. He had no trouble getting a team (the N.Y. Mets) to sign him—probably as a publicity stunt. Tim will put a lot of curious football fans in empty minor league seats, so this is a financial win for the Mets. At this writing, he is doing surprisingly well, but realistically he is a physically mature 29 year-old playing against mostly 19 year-olds, so his chances of making it to the majors remain very slim indeed. But I, for one, am rooting for Tim Tebow.

What can we learn from Tim Tebow? Plenty! But if I had to choose one word, it would be COURAGE. Tim had to have been told by teammates, coaches, friends, and most certainly his agent, that his career would be better off if he did not openly display his faith. He showed tremendous courage by sticking to his beliefs regardless of the consequences. Do we do that? Without going out on a limb, most of us could probably improve in that area.

It just isn't fair what this good guy has had to endure with regard to his football career. Recently another star football player, former New England Patriot Aaron Hernandez, was in the news for



committing suicide in his prison cell while serving a life sentence for murder. Ironically he had just been acquitted of an unrelated double homicide only a week before his suicide. The guy had a rap sheet a mile long, but hypothetically if he had somehow been released from prison, teams would have been lining up to sign this troubled tight end. He was a very good receiver and—by the way—his friend and college quarterback was Tim Tebow.





From the Christian Education Board







The current political climate in America is bizarre and unusual, to say the least. With heightened passion comes heightened tension, and political passion at every point on the spectrum seems to have skyrocketed. In the midst of an unending barrage by the media, relentless news anchors, astringent bloggers, and poorly informed (yet strongly opinionated) Facebook posts, it's nearly impossible to not be influenced in some regard concerning the present state of our nation. I'm writing to change that and to solve all of your political problems. Just kidding! Asking me to give an informed political opinion would be like asking a four year-old to lecture on theoretical quantum physics. Instead, I'm writing to remind all of us of three biblical truths that, as Christians, we would all be wise to remember, regardless of political persuasion.


- 1. You are an alien. No, you're not a little green guy; and no, you (probably) don't have antennas sticking from the top of your head, but you are an alien in this world. Peter calls Christians "sojourners" and "exiles" (1 Pet. 2:11). Paul reminds the Philippians that their "citizenship is in heaven" (Phil. 3:20). And Jesus tells us that we are "not of this world" (John 15:19). As Christians, we must remember that America is not our home, heaven is. We are exiles in this foreign (and temporary) country of America. We don't belong here and we won't stay here long. We are aliens.
- 2. **Jesus is Lord.** This should be a solace to every believer. It is in Christ that all things hold together (Col. 1:17). The Trinity works everything to its perfect end (Proverbs 16:4). God appoints kings, tears them down, and gives governmental authority to whomever He chooses (Rom. 13:1). Jesus providentially reigns over all, perfectly executing His perfect will. This is not an excuse for inactivity or prayerlessness, but is a cause for unshakable Christian peace.
- 3. We have a future hope. Christ will return to rescue His bride and to deliver everlasting torment to those who oppose Him (Matt. 25:46). He will make all things new and right (Rev. 21:5). He will correct the wrongs and bring justice where it is due. Those who have mocked the glory of God will be the object of His righteous indignation, but the saints will spend an eternity experiencing the most pleasurable thing there is to experience Christ Himself. No matter who you are, if you are a Christian, you have hope. Maranatha.
