### <u>A Message From the Diaconate</u>



The apostle Paul originally wrote this eloquent passage on love for the community in Corinth which was deep in conflict and dissention, to the point of its future being in peril. Paul established this Christian community in Corinth (in present-day Greece) less than twenty years after the crucifixion of Jesus. Through his powerful preaching and teaching, people from all walks of life had come together to live, not according to the culture, but to follow a way of life based on God's love.

Paul loved this community, so imagine his shock and despair when two years later, in Ephesus (in present-day Turkey), he received word that his beloved community was in crisis. What happened? Instead of following Christ's teaching, the Corinthians had become arrogant about their new-found spirituality. They were living self-centered lives rather than loving one another, so Paul wrote a

letter imploring them to return to living as Jesus taught - based on God's love.

Paul's message asserts the permanence of love, contrasting it with other spiritual expressions that are more transitory. Paul was convinced that at the heart of the world is God's desire for all people to experience love and give love. At the end of time, when God completes His good and loving purposes, nothing but love will matter. We won't need faith or hope anymore, as all will be fulfilled in God, but love will remain for eternity! Love is the constant which endures from this imperfect world, now until the perfect time to come.

Why have Paul's words endured for over two millennia? Perhaps because our hearts resonate with Paul's conviction that love is all we need—as complicated and conflicted as that can sometimes seem. Love is a power, a force that is unfathomable, immeasurable, eternal, and abiding. To love—to truly love is to participate in God's love for us which believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things. No matter what life gives us, God's love never fails and never ends.

#### 1 Corinthians 13

If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. If I give all I possess to the poor and surrender my body to the flames, but have not love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always preserves.

Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they will be stilled; where there is knowledge, it will pass away. For we know in part and we prophesy in part, but when perfection comes, the imperfect disappears. When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put childish ways behind me. Now we see but a poor reflection; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known.

And now these three remain: faith, hope, and love. But the greatest of these is love.

**The Problem:** In the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries, German and English scholars conceived a new perspective on Christ's incarnation. These scholars came to be known as "kenotic theologians" and the theory as the "kenosis theory" because the debate centered on Philippians 2:7, in which, Paul (or whoever wrote the Christ Hymn) used the verb kenoó (κενόω) with Christ as its subject. Kenotic theologians argued that kenoó meant "I empty" or "I deprive of content" based off a literalistic interpretation of the verb. With

this understanding of kenoó, they argued that Christ "emptied himself" of certain divine attributes in his incarnation.

He never uses it to describe some type of contents being emptied from a container. It is with terms like "the promise," "the cross," and "boasting," that kenoó is used. As Dennis E. Johnson writes, "Paul's use of the verb is not to invite the question "When Jesus 'emptied' himself, of what did he empty himself?" Paul's point, rather, is that Christ 'emptied' himself - made himself power-




