A Message From the Associate Pastor

A few weeks ago I attended a conference at which the plenary speaker spoke concerning the impassibility of God. Impassibility states that God, in His being, is unable to suffer, experience emotion, or experience pleasure as a result of the actions of another being. According to the doctrine of impassibility, God

is unable to feel passions. That is, God is not able to, in His essence, be acted upon by another. The reason classical theologians have historically held to the doctrine of impassibility is because, as Herman Bavinck states in his *Dogmatics*, "Those who predicate any change whatsoever of God, whether with respect to his essence, knowledge, or will, diminish all his attributes: independence, simplicity, eternity, omniscience, and omnipotence. This robs God of his divine nature, and religion of its firm foundation and assured comfort." Basically, if we believe in a simple God - that the being of God is identical to his attributes and that God is without parts - then it makes sense to say that God must be impassible because a change in the expression of His attributes would be a change in His essence and God's essence, we know, does not change.

I myself am still thinking through this issue. It is complex (pun intended) and difficult to navigate. But the fact I have taken hope in these past few weeks, regardless of where I end up concerning impassibility, is that God is immovable, immutable, and unchanging. What a joy it is that we serve a God who is the same yesterday, today, and forever! It is sobering to remember that the God who smote Sodom and Gomorrah is exactly the same God whom we sin against. And it is inconceivably liberating to remember that the God who graciously sent Christ to die in our place is still exactly the same God! It is because God is immutable that we can rest in the hope of heaven without fear of Him changing His mind. Our hope is secure and infallible because of our immutable God. Oh, praise Him!

The Greatest Commandment

Following up on last month's UPDATE article about the M28 approach to spiritual conversations with those we have invited into our church for special events, here are further items to keep in mind:

Read Matthew 22:34-40 and Mark 12:28-34

Three Observations on these Passages

- 1. No one really disputes the command to love God with all you possess. The problem isn't knowing this. The problem is doing it.
- 2. The second part of the Great Commandment, "loving your neighbor," is even more of a problem for most of us
- 3. If we are honest with ourselves, these two passages expose the gap between what you know and what you do.

20+ Things to Learn on Discipling Lost People

- 1. God loves lost people more than we imagine and He is working in their lives without us.
- 2. I am learning to follow Jesus where He is already working and don't feel the need to make things happen for Him.
- 3. The most receptive people to the Gospel are desperate, broken, and lost people. The more desperate, the more reachable.
- 4. The first criterion to look for in someone whom you wish to disciple is that they have an internal sense of desperation that is greater than their pride.
- 5. An early obstacle to discipling others (or even helping others) was my own unwillingness to tell others of my own brokenness.
- 6. Lost people are interested in spiritual conversations with us. But here is the caveat: They are prone to avoid judgmental, intolerant, all-knowing, Bible-thumping believers. I have even learned not to straighten people out when they are living in known sin. <u>Unless I have earned the right to say so, I keep quiet until it is appropriate.</u>
- 7. Love, not knowledge, changes the unbelievers' heart.
- 8. Love, not truth, changes lives.
- 9. Faith is more important than doctrines, beliefs, dogmas, creeds, and liturgies when discussing the "Good News."
- 10. When talking about God, I don't talk about salvation as a way to heaven, I talk about salvation as a way to God. They are not the same thing nor do they have the same result.
- 11. God-out-there vs. God with us.
- 12. Jesus didn't make converts; He made disciples. And He has not called us to make converts. He called us to make disciples [Mt. 28:19-20).
- 13. Discipleship is best done with a like-minded partner.
- 14. Discipleship is doing life with people, not doing church with them.
- 15. Doing life with lost people is hard work, and most church people retreat from it.
- 16. Doing life with lost people is inconvenient, strikes at my comfort, safety and desire for security.
- 17. Sharing the good news with others should not be done indiscriminately; there are some who will disdain it, mock it, and seek to invalidate it.
- 18. Discipling others changes your life most of all. If you want to grow spiritually, disciple some lost person. Find some fight to get into where someone's soul is at stake.
- 19. Discipleship is about participation with others, not just relationship with them.



20. Discipleship is more than just personal spiritual growth. Some people are looking to go to another church service, conference, retreat, Bible study, and prayer meeting to obtain another spiritual buzz to beef up their lives, but will not do life with a lost person across the street.

- 21. The language of sin seems totally foreign and unrelated to many who are unchurched. Rethink sin. What are we really wanting them to know?
- 22. The "Good News" is not good news to many people. It seems unrelated to real life.
- 23. I've learned to love lost people, but I have to work at it.


