I have a love/hate relationship with sugar. In certain phases of life I've drastically limited my sugar intake; intentionally

choosing not to indulge daily. Over time, I simply stopped craving my usual sugar fixes (ice cream, comes to mind). With it out of my system, I ceased longing for it. However, the second I reintroduce it to my normal diet, watch out! My body begins to crave and even need the sugar. Daily.

Cravings are funny like that. The more I indulge, the more I want. With ice cream, that's a problem, but when we're talking about craving God, that's a very, very good reality. Can I ask a question about your cravings?

On an average Tuesday, how much do you crave (long for; want greatly; desire eagerly; need) God? Please be honest and as subjective as possible.



Where did you rate yourself? On an average, run-of-the-mill day, how acutely aware of your need for Jesus are you? Do you live dependent upon our Father and in tune with the Spirit? How much do you long for His voice, seek out His will, recognize your need for His presence and power in your day?

The more we "ingest" God (spending time in His presence and Word, asking for His intervention, relying on Him in our daily tasks), the more we will crave Him each and every day. That means, if you average a The church office will be 4 on the scale above, the more you intentionally talk to Him, look for His hand, and ask Him to use you throughout an average day, the more you will hear Him, see Him at work, and receive His call. You'll begin to crave God more and more, as you slide a little closer to knowing satisfaction in Him on the scale.

So as 2019 begins, what will you do to grow your craving and "dig in" to the Lord? Why not try one of these ideas or use them as a launching pad for your own? *(continued of page 2)*

- Set an alarm to go off each waking hour of your day. When it goes off wherever you are, whatever you're doing pray. Invite the LORD into that moment. And see if a craving to be with Him in every situation grows.
- Commit to a Bible reading plan like one found at <u>www.bible.com</u> and get in it *daily*. Consider picking up a book like *How To Read the Bible Book by Book* or *How to Read the Bible For All It's Worth* by Gordon Fee to help you understand more of what you're reading.
- Join a Community Group to invite others to walk with you in developing and satisfying your craving for God.
- Tune your radio station, find a Pandora station, or rework your ITunes playlist to Christian music. Turn it on in the car, while you're doing housework, or exercising. Let worship become a part of your daily routine.

Let me know what you decide to do! I'd love to pray with you in this new year.

<u>From the Associate Pastor</u>



Outside of the New Testament, the oldest written account of Christian martyrdom is a letter written as early as AD 156, commonly called *The Martyrdom of Polycarp*. In it, a detailed account, presumably by an eyewitness, is given of Polycarp's venerable death for the sake of Christ. As Polycarp is about to be burned at the stake for refusing to renounce Christ, he cries out "You threaten with a fire that burns only briefly and after just a little while is extinguished, for you are ignorant of

the fire of the coming judgement and eternal punishment, which is reserved for the ungodly. But why do you delay? Come! Do what you wish!"

The bravery of Polycarp's stoically uncompromising posture in the face of lethal opposition served to strengthen the churches who read of it. *The Martyrdom of Polycarp* circulated through hundreds of churches and served to bring hope to those facing persecution and encourage those downcast. In our age of persecution-free comfort, with luxury cars, memory foam mattresses, and electric toothbrushes, it is necessary to remember the martyrs of the past – and those of the present. Martyrdom and severe physical persecution are the norm for the Christian church. The world has always hated Christians. They still do. It's just easier to see it when they are slaughtering us by the dozens.

Though our culture's collective physical suffering is at an all-time low, meditation on Christian martyrdom and persecution should remind us of something: persecution has historically been good for the church of Christ – not bad. The church has experienced its largest, and deepest, growth when it faces persecution and seems to develop the most stagnancy when it is most com-

fortable. Where the blood of Christians has been shed, the church of Christ multiplies. The church thrives where it is being built on the spilled blood and broken bones of Christians.

It might seem like an extreme assertion, but this thought has led me to consider praying that persecution would come to the church in America. I mean real persecution. Not to belittle being mocked by coworkers, a harsh social media encounter, or a painfully severed relationship, but comparatively, those things don't hold a candle to being beheaded, crucified, or buried alive. Perhaps it would be a good thing if American Christians began to be martyred. Perhaps it would serve to shake us out of our complacency, separate the wheat from the chaff, and refocus our attention on the primacy and ultimacy of the gospel of Jesus Christ. I can't help but think that maybe, if our families began to be killed in front of us, burned at the stake like Polycarp, we would begin to take Christ more seriously. Maybe, just maybe, we should pray for persecution.

- Small containers of peanut butter
- Small containers of jelly •
- Tab-Top ready-to-eat canned/bagged meals (Raviolis, Spaghetti O's, Kid-Friendly Soups, *Pasta with Sauce, etc.*)
- Easy Mac cups
- Individuals cups of fruit •
- Individual cups of pudding •

These items must be able to be carried home in a backpack by a child and prepared by a child. Many of these children only have a microwave for preparing food. Items must be shelfstable (no refrigeration available) and the foods need to be "Sturdy" (no pop-tarts or easily crushable foods.)
