The American Baptist Church Leadership Institute is a ministry of the American Baptist Churches of Pennsylvania and Delaware.

This ministry which started out of a felt need among the churches and leaders of the southwestern region of ABCOPAD back in the late 1980's blossomed across the region to include three different Coordinating Councils each seeking to offer the same ;quality courses to the lay leaders in their particular geographic areas. In recent months, the three Councils have been working together to discern God's plan for the future of this ministry. Rather than operating independently, the three Councils believe that God is calling them to unite their efforts in discipleship and training under the banner of a new ministry called, Academy for Christian Training and Service.

Our purpose is to train and educate:

Two institutions were united in 1932 to form Alderson-Broaddus College. The older of the two, Broaddus College, was founded in Winchester, Virginia in 1871 by Edward Jefferson Willis, a Baptist minister who named the new college after Rev. William Francis Ferguson Broaddus, a prominent Baptist minister at the time of the Civil War. In response to economic hard times, Broaddus College was moved across the Alleghenies to Clarksburg, West Virginia, in 1876. The college was moved again to the small town of Philippi, West Virginia in 1901.

The other institution, Alderson Academy and Junior College, was founded in Alderson, West Virginia in 1901 by Emma Alderson, a committed Baptist laywoman. As the years passed, Broaddus became a junior college, then a senior college, and Alderson Academy added junior college status. Financial hardship in the late 1920's led to the decision to merge the two colleges, both of which shared a common identity as Baptist and liberal arts institutions. Alderson-Broaddus College derives its hyphenated name from the joining of these two institutions.

Alderson-Broaddus College offers programs in the health sciences, social sciences, humanities, natural sciences and education. The College maintains strong ties with the American Baptist Churches U.S.A., and encourages the academic goals of expanding knowledge, intellectual inquiry, and critical thinking. It also encourages Christian values, including reasoned religious belief, personal moral integrity, and service to others

Eastern University and Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary were re-united on July 1, 2003, sixteen years after they officially separated in 1987.

Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary, near Philadelphia was established in 1925 with the motto “The Whole Gospel for the Whole World” as its driving force. Though affiliated with American Baptist Churches, USA, the Seminary welcomes students from a variety of denominations. United Methodists, Presbyterians and Mennonites are among the denominations represented in Eastern Seminary’s 700-member student body.

Eastern College was founded in 1932 as a department of the Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary. In 1952, the college became a separate institution called Eastern Baptist College and was accredited two years later. The name was changed to Eastern College in 1972 to increase the appeal of the college to all evangelical Christians, though the college retains its relationship to the American Baptist Churches in the U.S.A. Eastern was granted University status in 2001 by the PA Department of Education.

Eastern University serves 3,000 students in School of Arts and Sciences, Campolo School for Social Change, School for International Leadership and Development, and School of Professional Studies. They also include over 100 international students from more than 30 countries, and at least 20% of undergraduates are minority students.

The Seminary offers Doctor of Ministry programs in Ministry to Marriage and Family and in The Renewal of the Church for Mission. Masters level programs include the Master of Divinity and the Master of Theological Studies, with emphases in Biblical Studies, Contemporary Theology, Christian Faith and Public Policy, Christian Heritage, Christian Mission and Christian Counseling. The Seminary also offers several one-year certificates and two-year diploma programs through Eastern’s School of Christian Ministry (ESCM); these classes are held at the Seminary’s main campus and at satellite campuses around the region.

The Evangelical Seminary of Puerto Rico (ESPR), founded in 1919, was formed by the union of the Puerto Rican Theological Seminary (Presbyterian) in Mayaquez, the Grace Conway Institute (Baptist) in Rio Piedras, the Robinson Institute (Methodist) in Hatillo, and the Disciples of Christ Institute (Christian Church) in Bayamon. In 1930, the seminary acquired the three acres of land on which its current facilities are built.

The seminary's primary purpose is the training of pastoral and lay leaders for service in the ministry and the mission of God's people in Puerto Rico, the Caribbean, Latin America, and the United States of America. The Seminary offers a Master of Divinity Degree for the education of pastoral leaders, and a Master of Arts in Religion degree.

ESPR graduates have served in Christian ministry in Cuba, Dominican Republic, Columbia, Costa Rica, Guatemala, Mexico, Peru, El Salvador, Venezuela, Nicaragua, Panama, Brazil and Spain.

ABMen is an organization dedicated to providing resources and support to men throughout the American Baptist denomination. AB Men of WSBC meets monthly at the church. Various guest speakers encourage the spiritual growth of the participants and the members perform various outreach ministries. WSBC provides an annual contribution of \$180 to assist this ministry. American Baptist Men provide disaster support with a Disaster Relief trailer that goes to locations and provides food, supplies and manpower.

AMERICAN BAPTIST WOMEN

ABWM meets at West Shore Baptist at least twice per quarter. Meetings are used to build the spiritual walk of the women and to further its many works of outreach. Guest speakers, craft projects, plays, singing, food and fellowship serve to draw the women closer to God and to each other. ABWM of WSBC also join women from other AB churches at area, regional and national conferences. Offerings are taken to further ministry outreach and voluntary love gifts may be proffered to further God's work.

White Cross

White Cross had its start during World War I when American Baptist Women assisted the American Red Cross by providing surgical bandages and other supplies for the U.S. service personnel. After the war, this effort was channeled by two women from Cleveland, Ohio into Baptist Missions as the “White Cross Service League.”

Today, White Cross provides urgently needed supplies, through church contributions. Recipients include Native American ministries, Neighborhood Action Christian Centers, inner city missions and mission sites in Alaska and Puerto Rico.

This mission is not a budgeted item. The women of ABWM donate funds or gifts in kind to this ministry.

Love Gift

Love Gift began in 1932 as a result of the Great Depression. Fearing the financial crisis would limit God’s work, the Board of Missionary Cooperation (now World Mission Support) asked individual’s to give contributions above their tithes and pledges. The Committee on Conference (now the National Committee on Women’s Work) challenged women to raise \$150,000. The women began the over-and-above contribution called Love Gift.

Since the beginning, women have collected these gifts in small boxes. Originally called Silver Boxes (the cloud’s silver lining), later Mite boxes and now called Love Gift Boxes. Women fill the boxes with their change. Love Gifts are part of the United Mission which supports the range of American Baptist missions.

Annually, ABWM contribute over \$3 Million per year to American Baptist mission through these ministries. WSBC does not budget for this ministry. The ABWM donate funds to the love gift above their regular tithes and offerings.

ANNUAL SHORT-TERM MISSION

Recently, West Shore Baptist has re-committed itself to short term missions. Each Summer West Shore Baptist intends to sponsor a short term mission (7-10 days). The participants pay half of their food, lodging and travel costs. The rest of the costs are covered by the church. Fund raising activities and contributions from Church members enable this ministry to occur. WSBC would like to alternate between US and International ministries. In 2002 members went to Rocky Mount, North Carolina to assist with a Habitat to Humanity project to replace homes destroyed in a flood. In 2003, members painted the new Seminary Building in Mexicali in the Mexican Baja Peninsula and in 2004 members worked at the Evangelical Seminary in Puerto Rico.

Bethesda's Mission: to reach out a helping hand to the men and women of the streets for the purpose of "Introducing them to the Gospel of Jesus Christ," and providing them with food, shelter, clothing, fellowship and Christian counseling. It is our prayer that in time, Bethesda Mission's guests will emerge as productive, capable, mature adults.

Bethesda Mission accomplishes this mission by operating a Men's Shelter for 85 men, A Women and Children's Shelter for 30, a Youth Shelter serving 6 to 15 year olds, a Mobile Mission which ministered to 3, 210 in 2002 and a Medical Clinic. During 2002, they served nearly 97,400 meals and beds were slept in nearly 38,100 times. The two recovery programs had nearly 312 enrolled. In addition, the men and women received social services, medical care and most of all, the opportunity to know the Lord.

Additionally, the Baptones host an annual concert each year which benefits Bethesda Mission.

“THE BRIDGE” FOOD PANTRY

The Bridge is a food pantry that serves residents in Cumberland County. Volunteers run the program using a monthly food distribution out of a trailer next to the Senior Center in New Cumberland. Clients using the pantry receive an ID card which is presented at each visit, which is currently the third Friday of the month in the morning. The average number of household is 74. CCU provides all financial activities for the program. William W. Holland is the executive director. More volunteers are always needed to help. They receive contributions from several churches on the West Shore and a supplement from the County to use at the Food Bank. The program also benefits from Crop Walk

Members also donate food items throughout the year and for the annual Thanksgiving Harvest Home offering.

The Capital Area Pregnancy Centers exist to demonstrate unconditional love to those in a crisis pregnancy through spiritual and emotional counseling, material support, and education. All services are free and confidential. Services include:

- Free pregnancy tests.
- Education on pregnancy, fetal development and abortion risks and alternatives.
- Confidential and non-judgmental counseling.
- Referrals for medical, legal, social services and adoption assistance.
- Clothing and furnishings for mother and baby.
- Abortion recovery counseling and support.
- Spanish-speaking counselors (by appointment only).
- "Waiting - the Smart Choice" Abstinence education programs.

The CAPC in Camp Hill has recently added a volunteer Doctor to its staff and is interviewing nurses. Once the individual is selected, the CAPC will be able to perform medical services to include ultra-sound examinations.

Our church has supported CAPC in many ways to include Baby Showers, the annual Baby Bottle Blast, the annual Walk for Life, volunteers to work at the center and sponsor a table at the Annual Banquet for Life.

Christian Churches United (CCU) is the fiscal agent for several Dauphin County ministries to include five shelters: Shalom House, the Interfaith Family Shelter, the YWCA, Bethesda Mission and occasionally the YMCA.

It's HELP ministries include:

1. Rental Assistance Program: This program helps individuals who are delinquent with rent (for certain specified situations and those who need assistance with security deposits).
2. Permanency for Families: This assists individuals with goal planning, budgeting and parenting skills. This is a seven-week process.
3. Case Management for those in its three shelters. Managers have an initial meeting with clients within 48 hours of arrival in a shelter. Meetings are held at least weekly thereafter to assist individuals in making plans for where to live after leaving the shelter as clients may only stay in a shelter for 30 days. It also provides life skills such as anger management, time management, self-esteem, building and job readiness courses (resume's, dressing for success, etc).

It also supports La Casa de Amistad with translation services, AIDS outreach and case management assistance to help families to obtain government services and other assistance when their primary language isn't English.

CCU's volunteer missions include:

1. Prison Action Committee (Prison Chaplains and Community members)
2. The Bridge, which is a food pantry distributing donated non-perishable food items to needy members of the community
3. Lend-A Hand. This is a volunteer ministry helping those who have lost homes east of the Mississippi due to natural disasters. It coordinates transportation, housing and labor assignments for volunteers working with initial disaster clean up and recovery.

CCU sponsors the annual CROP Walk to feed the hungry in the US and around the world.

In addition to an annual contribution, WSBC members provide personal care items for the shelters (some of which are also individually supported by the church), and either walk or sponsor walkers for the CROP walk.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY HARRISBURG

Habitat for Humanity works worldwide in partnership with God and people from all walks of life. By assisting people in need with home ownership, it builds decent communities where every person can experience God's love.

Habitat for Humanity of the Greater Harrisburg Area builds or renovates a home. It is then sold to a low-income family in need of their own simple, decent housing. Home size and accessibility is based on family need. Through a no-interest mortgage, Habitat makes it possible for families of low or modest income to buy a house. Each candidate must volunteer 350 hours for the Habitat affiliate. This is called "sweat equity" They must pay 1% of the selling price at closing and pay their mortgage monthly.

Harrisburg's Habitat program began over 15 years ago. Initially, Harrisburg renovated 8 row homes in the 1400 Block of Zarker Street. West Shore Baptist began its support in 1989 and has continued since with the additional 10 homes on Zarker, two new build duplexes on Chestnut St, 3 duplexes on 13th Street, a home on Balm Street and one on State. Currently, Harrisburg's habitat is renovating two homes on State Street, and is renovating a city donated warehouse for use as both the new office and a storage site/store in support of Habitat's work.

Volunteers from the church work at the site on the 4th Saturday of each month. Additionally, Habitat can use volunteers during weekdays for on-site as well as office work, to speak to organizations in order to promote the organization or to raise funds, or work on its many committees.

Second Chance ministries presents the good news of Jesus Christ as the source of hope and new life for incarcerated men and women. They then train, disciple, and raise up Godly individuals for the army of Christ.

In coordination and cooperation with the parole and court systems, the Department of Corrections and other ministry organizations, the ministry establishes bible study fellowship groups in institutions, visits the inmates regularly, works with them prior to release, and after release it helps them find housing and jobs, as well as emotional and spiritual support. Second Chance also organizes support groups for the families. It also provides prison ministry retreats and workshops, and conducts volunteer teaching and training sessions.

COMMUNITY CONCERNS AND PROJECTS

This budget item allows the mission board the flexibility to address any community concerns or projects which have not received designated funding.

MISSION EDUCATION AND PROMOTION

This budget item enables the church to promote missions by arranging for mission speakers and covering their expenses, to purchase of books, tapes or other promotional materials.

Giving Missions

UNITED MISSION



The largest portion of the American Baptist Mission support budget is the United Mission. These contributions from the local churches provide the foundation of support for God's mission through the American Baptist Church, USA. It is funded three ways: by undesignated

contributions from local churches, by designated contributions from local churches to a specific regional, national or general American Baptist Mission or ministry and by United Mission Love gifts from American Baptist women in support of missions given over-and-above United Mission basics.

United Mission supports ministries for prayer and witness, renewal and worship, children and youth, adults and elderly, families and singles, pastors and lay leaders, Christian education, stewardship and tithing, church planting, camps and conferences, disaster relief, overseas and home missionaries, ecumenical relations, the general board and mission education.

United Mission dollars are distributed as follows: 54% for Regional Ministries; 13% for General Ministries; 9% for International Ministries; 7% for Educational Ministries; 6% for Shared Ministries; 4% for National Ministries; 3% for Institutional Ministries; 3% for Representation Ministries and 1% is held in Reserve for Ministries.

United Mission dollars are a percentage of the total WSBC budget.

SPECIAL ANNUAL OFFERINGS

America for Christ

Gifts to the America for Christ offering facilitate God's ministry in the United States and Puerto Rico. Our church sets an annual goal, announced during mission promotion for the offering, which is dedicated in March.

One Great Hour of Sharing

Received in June, this offering provides for those most in need. For over 50 years, One Great Hour has provided developmental aid, refugee assistance, and helped people to overcome poverty, disease, and trauma due to conflicts and natural disasters in over 70 countries. Our church sets an annual goal, announced during mission promotion for the offering, which is dedicated in June.

World Mission

Gifts to World Mission provide evangelism and discipleship, leadership development, urban mission centers, and economic assistance to our brethren around the world. Our church sets an annual goal, announced during mission promotion for the offering, which is dedicated in October.

Christmas Offering

Since 1935, American Baptists have contributed to special offerings received in their churches for retired ABC ministers and missionaries, or their widowed spouses. A portion of these funds are used to fund emergency needs and the rest are provided directly to these servants as a Christmas thank you. Our church sets an annual goal, announced during mission promotion for the offering, which is dedicated in December. Since the December offering is usually the year's largest, the mission board may sometimes select one other mission and divide the offering between the two missions.
