## From the Desk of Pastor Kelly

Best friends can get away with anything. I popped up to New Hampshire in June for a quick visit with mine. A few minutes after arriving she looked over at me and frowned deeply, "COVID hasn't been good to you, Kelly." Perplexed, I asked where this out of the blue statement came from. "Your hair is turning white. You look old." Thus ended our visit. ;-)

She's not wrong, sadly. The past several months, as we are all well aware, have been stressful and, while apparently my hair color tells plenty, the reports coming out of research centers indicate that we are experiencing consistently higher rates of anxiety, depression, fear, and generalized stress than before. You know it, too, without reading any of those reports. All you have to do is talk to a family member, friend, or neighbor and you'll hear a roller coaster of emotions in their voice.

The question is, what do we do with all of those emotions, friends? As covenant people who are *in Christ*, where do we take fear and anger, anxiety and guilt, our doubts and our faith? Lately I've been hearing people respond to their anxiety, for instance, like this: "I am *really* anxious about (fill in the blank), but I know I shouldn't feel that way." Or someone will express their frustration at depression along these lines: "I just don't have any energy to do anything. I know I'm depressed, but I shouldn't be! God doesn't want me to be. So I just need to get over it." Others choose to deny their fears by saying, "God hasn't given us a spirit of fear! So I just won't be afraid of (fill in the blank)."

But what if all of those emotions are actually God-given? What if it's impossible to love God with all of who you are, without loving Him with and through the very emotions that most make you uncomfortable? What if the person bothered by your emotions isn't God, it's simply you?

Now, please don't misunderstand me, how I *react* to all of my emotions is not always God-honoring, right, or best. But the emotions themselves are part of bearing His image, expressing the fullness of who He is, and discovering the depths of a very real relationship with Him. That's why the rest of our summer will be about exploring what it looks like not to stuff or deny or even embrace our emotions, but to pray them. Each Sunday we will explore a different Psalm, entering into the incredibly real and raw emotions the psalmist brings to the Father and allowing the Gospel of Jesus Christ to capture our hearts.

It's going to be a very honest, incredibly good summer. Come ready to encounter Jesus.

#### From Pastor Greg

With the fourth of July we celebrate the anniversary of America's Declaration of Independence from Great Britain. Since 1941, when Independence Day became a federal holiday, Americans have celebrated their freedom from Britain with fireworks, barbeques, parades, and, of course, beer. The celebrations commemorating this historic event are monumental and often quite loud – as they should be! After all, independence from Great Britain was a historically noteworthy event, worthy of celebratory remembrance.

However, for the Christian American, there is an even greater reason for celebration. The Christian, on the Lord's Day each week, celebrates his independence, not from the tyranny of Britain, but from the clutches of sin and death. The Christian, most fundamentally, is not a citizen of America. In fact, he is not, most basally, a citizen of any earthly nation. At his core, the Christian is a citizen of heaven. We, as those who are saved by faith in the Lord Jesus, belong in the city of God – not man. Therefore, this world, as it currently stands, is not our home. We are strangers, exiles, aliens, and foreigners; awaiting the resurrection and hoping in the promise that He who died for us is returning to reconcile all things to Himself.

When you, as a Christian, think about the hope that your citizenship promises to you, does it enthrall you? Are you gripped by the coming realities that are promised to you in Christ? Do you feel – down deep in your bones - that you do not belong in America, but belong in the New Jerusalem? Do you long for Him to return? If not, why not? May we never buy into the lie that earthly, American citizenship can begin to parallel heavenly citizenship. May we never begin to believe that America is where we belong, or that this earth is our home. May we endlessly fight to be more consistent and genuine citizens of heaven. May we celebrate our citizenship with a vigor that puts the festivities of Independence Day to shame. After all, we have been rescued from far more than Great Britain, and we are citizens of a nation far greater than America. Let us celebrate!
