## From the Desk of Pastor Kelly

Our anniversary is just around the corner, friend. Do you know the one I'm referencing? The one-year anniversary of our two-week lockdown! © I say that in a tongue-in-cheek manner, of course, but the truth is that one year ago this month everything changed.

One year ago, we transitioned our services online, first through pre-recorded messages and emailed home liturgies, then to the wild, wonderful world of Zoom (complete with kitty cats, pancakes, and PJs). One year ago, we needed to put a halt to community groups, Sunday school classes, music ministry rehearsals, and summer outreach plans. For the safety of one another and our wider community, we shifted everything virtually and learned how to 'visit' on telephones and from front lawns.

As we approach that milestone together, I find myself reflecting on what the LORD has given us in this past year. While much changed one year ago, the truth of whose we are and who we are remained perfectly steadfast. If anything, that identity simply went deeper into our DNA here at WSBC. For instance:

- We shifted from seeing corporate worship as a nice part of our weekly rhythm, to recognizing our vital need to
  obey our God and refuse to forsake the gathering together of His saints to sing His praises, boldly approach His
  throne, and receive His word with open minds and hearts. Now, more than ever, we're committed to being
  disciples who believe through worship and are willing to do so in whatever means possible.
- A year of separation drove deep our desire to **belong** to one another in community. We long for connection and relationships where we are known and encouraged to pursue Jesus even more fully. That is why more than 50 people are joining a community group this season.
- The uncertainty of the past year reminds us that no one is guaranteed another day. Yet, all of us will stand before the LORD one day to give the account of our life. Either we will pay for our sin or Jesus will. This year is calling us to **bridge** the Gospel with greater fervency and compassion than ever before.
- And a year of disappointment and frustration, sadness and loss revealed for many of us that we long to
  become like our Savior marked by the fruit of His Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness,
  faithfulness, gentleness & self-control). Becoming like Him, though, is utterly impossible without opening our
  lives to other believers who love Him, love us, and will hold us accountable to surrender to who we are in Him
  more and more.

Without doubt, this has been a crazy year. But as we approach the anniversary, I find myself incredibly hopeful for what lies in our future. Not a life that returns to "normal." But a life together that even more fully embraces our God-given mission to love Him and make disciples who believe, belong, bridge, and become.

#### From Pastor Greg

Growing up, I remember being captivated by stories of heroic Christian martyrs. Men and women with other-worldly courage, doing great works for God, and then dying a horrific death, all while never losing an ounce of faith. A protestant man being burned at the stake for his declaration that justification was by faith alone; and even while his skin shriveled belting out hymns with such exuberance that onlookers, taken aback by his faith, were converted on the spot. That sort of thing. I so greatly admired the faith, courage, and all-out commitment of these saints of the past that I unwittingly began to place those who experienced extreme persecution or accomplished much for the Lord in a more "spiritual" category than the rest of us normal Christians. I esteemed and idealized this manner of living the Christian life so much that it was almost as if I was doing something wrong, or at least spiritually inferior, if I was not in perpetual danger of being waterboarded, burned at the stake, or thrown to starving lions. This is extreme, but you know what I mean; and I think we all do something similar.

We all tend to place vocations into spiritually ranked categories, for instance. We might not ever say it, but we've determined that being a nurse in Haiti is somehow spiritually superior to being an electrician in Mechanicsburg. Using your law degree to fight sex trafficking in China is more spiritual than using it to reform property law in Camp Hill. And being a pastor is spiritually superior to being a plumber. That's why pastors, not plumbers, are always asked to pray at dinner, pray at board meetings, pray at lunches, pray at business meetings, and pray at every other event where there could possibly be prayer. After all, what else are pastors but professional Christians (Sarcasm)? The point is, we so often subconsciously divide Christians into more-spiritual and less-spiritual categories and venerate the Christians whose lives are more 'exciting.'

The Bible, however, does no such thing. Rather, Scripture repeatedly commands Christians to live normal, quiet lives (1 Tim. 2:2, 1 Thess. 4:11). In other words, doing 'great' things for the Lord often probably looks less like nailing theses to doors and more like minding your own business and not causing too much of a fuss, less like being burned at the stake while belting out hymns and more like careful Bible study with an obediently humble heart, less like being mauled by lions and more like a grateful spirit and a committed prayer life. Granted, nailing a thesis, being burned at the stake, and being mauled by lions for acts of faith are not inherently bad things at all, but they also should not be presented as normal or more spiritual — and definitely not as required in order to live a faithful Christian life. The faithful Christian life, as the Bible portrays it, is not marked primarily by bold, public declarations of faith, but by characteristics such as quietness, love, humility, sober-mindedness, a smallness on one's own mind, meekness, joy, patience, an others-centeredness, love for God's word, peace, prayerfulness, slowness to speak, gentleness, and self-control — to name a few.

The older professor who shepherded me through the challenges of being a tenure-track faculty member. The experienced guitarist who let me explore his extensive collection of instruments and helped me find my own style. The wiser friend who helped me make the tough decisions that would stabilize my household finances. What do these three men all have in common? All were mentors to me at key moments of my life. Their influence had a profound impact that continues to this day.

Many of us have mentors at work or in our hobbies, but how many of us have mentors that help us in our spiritual walk? Here at WSBC, we're keenly interested in developing spaces where spiritual mentoring relationships can develop. What would your life be like if a more experienced Christian played an active role in your daily walk with God? What if there was a trusted, God-centered friend you could turn to in times of crisis, in times of stagnation, in times of confusion and doubt?

The other side of the mentoring relationship is just as important. In our congregation, we have a wealth of experience, wisdom, and perspective. One of the most important things that Christians can do to help one another become more like Christ is sharing the hard-earned insights that only come from a life spent following Jesus. What if you could provide a listening ear for a person struggling with some of the same issues that used to weigh you down? What if you could speak the words of encouragement and hope that they need to hear?

Mentoring relationships offer rich rewards for both people involved. Mentoring can't be forced, though. This kind of relationship arises when the different generations of our church are engaged with and talking with each other. Mentoring happens when we trust each other enough to open up about the struggles we have today—and the challenges that we overcame in the past. Mentoring happens when we realize that we're not meant to live life alone, but in community with other Christians.

There are many reasons why God called you to WSBC right now. Maybe one of those reasons is that there's a person here who can help mentor you through the trials that you're facing, the obstacles that seem too large to overcome. Maybe there's a person here who desperately needs your encouragement, perspective, and faithful friendship. Right now is the perfect time to find out. We're launching new community groups this spring, and we're excited to see how many people have expressed interest in joining one. Get plugged into a community group to experience how Godcentered mentoring can build you up as you learn how to live more like Jesus.
