From the Desk of Pastor Kelly

In my time of prayer & bible study this morning, a few simple lines in Psalm 116 struck me.

In its wider context, the psalmist speaks of a season when he cried out to the Father for deliverance and came to know God's character (He is gracious and righteous, full of compassion) and power through that season. As he reflects back on how God rescued him from death, he says:

How can I repay the LORD
for all His goodness to me?
I will lift up the cup of salvation
and call on the name of the LORD.
I will fulfill my vows to the LORD
in the presence of all His people. (Psalm 116:12-14)

I love his opening question: How can I repay the LORD for all of His goodness shown to me? Can you imagine? Trying to repay the good and gracious, kind and faithful King for all of His acts of love toward us? To repay Him for every breath we take, for the beauty of creation, or the signs of His care? To compensate Him for the giving of His Son on our behalf, the deliverance from death won on the cross, the promise of eternal hope?

That's a gift I simply cannot repay.

Yet, the psalmist says, there are a few ways I can respond to the overwhelming goodness of our God. First, I can "lift up the cup of salvation" and call on His name. We do that every time we gather for communion. We lift up the cup of our salvation, the symbol that reminds us that we are saved by Christ's sacrifice on our behalf. We lift it up and declare, "I cannot save me. I cannot pay for my own sin debt. I *need* a Savior and I have the only one there is — Jesus." We lift up the cup and declare that salvation is found in no other name.

What a funny way to "repay" God's goodness. Yet, it's a beautiful statement. Every time I come to the Table, I declare that I am not my savior. Neither are all the things and people I call upon. I am re-centered in Christ. And I declare to you, and you to me, that we are truly saved by and the greatest expression of God's goodness is found in Jesus alone.

And after I lift up the cup, I can fulfill my vows in the presence of God's people. Last week we reaffirmed our baptismal covenant. Those words contain the promises we've made to the Lord to obey Him, our Master, and serve Him all of our days. We vowed to allow Him full-access to our lives; to transform any and every part of us that does not fully reflect His glory. To love the least of these. To declare the Gospel in word and deed.

None of us will do so perfectly. But as we declare He is Savior with the cup, we do the same with our lives as we seek to fulfill those vows. And that's a beautiful response to His goodness.

With Easter having just passed, I've been thinking quite a bit about the resurrection. And one thing that I'm realizing anew is – Jesus' resurrection changes everything. The evidence for Jesus' resurrection is compelling. The witnesses, the martyrs, the explosion of Christianity in the first centuries, the numerous gospel accounts, the specific prophecies about the resurrection hundreds of years before, and more all credibly indicate that Jesus' resurrection was a historical event, not a comforting myth. The resurrection really happened. And if it did, then it changes everything.

If Jesus didn't raise from the dead, I'm a fraud – a liar, a fool, and a scammer; a pastor exploiting an old myth for selfish gain. If Jesus didn't get up from the grave and walk out, then my entire life is pointless. If Jesus didn't resurrect, then no one else will resurrect either. If Jesus didn't die for three days and then wake up, then I'm not going to either and I might as well quit my job and try to find as much momentary happiness as I can before I die. If Jesus is still in the grave, then Christianity is meaningless and we're all gullible, optimistic, morons for falling for a silly little ancient myth.

But...if Jesus really did rise from the dead, then that changes everything. If Jesus really resurrected then our lives can truly be full of meaning, eternal meaning, for we have something ultimate and transcendent to live for. If Jesus really did resurrect, then we are not fools, but sinners saved by grace. If Jesus really died and then rose to live then someday so will we. Here's the mind-blowingly comforting truth that I've been struck with this week: Christian, if Jesus really rose from the dead, everything really is going to be okay.

"Brothers and sisters in Christ" the minister sometimes calls us – a family term, one that comes directly from the Bible.

We nod when that is said; perhaps we share the peace of the Lord; we even gather at your table, as families are going to do.

Lord, help me to appreciate these people...not just as fellow members of a congregation, but as "blood relatives," in a way. United to save us all...and to unite us in this special family.

Not just "brothers and sisters" – although that would be special enough – but "brothers and sisters in Christ."

I praise and thank the Lord for leading me into this congregation of loving and caring brothers and sisters in You. I AM BLESSED

- ¹² Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³ For we were all baptized by one Spirit so as to form one body—whether Jews or Gentiles, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. ¹⁴ Even so the body is not made up of one part but of many.
- ¹⁵ Now if the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. ¹⁶ And if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. ¹⁷ If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be? ¹⁸ But in fact God has placed the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. ¹⁹ If they were all one part, where would the body be? ²⁰ As it is, there are many parts, but one body.
- ²¹ The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!" ²² On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and the parts that we think are less honorable we treat with special honor. And the parts that are unpresentable are treated with special modesty, ²⁴ while our presentable parts need no special treatment. But God has put the body together, giving greater honor to the parts that lacked it, ²⁵ so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. ²⁶ If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it.

²⁷ Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it. *I Corinthians 12:12-27 - NIV*

Here is Carol's:

At Diaconate meetings we plan special worship services, and discuss ways to enhance meaningful weekly worship, and we also come up with ideas for fellowship events. But as I was thinking about the different masks that I sometimes wear, I realized God knows who I am, no matter what I'm trying to hide behind! Ouch! I took a picture of the homework that she gave us on the screen, to remind myself each day to try to be transparent and honest, and to know that I can only wear my mask of tragedy and comedy on stage when I'm doing theater, and not in real life!

I can't wait for the day that we can take off these masks that we are wearing and see each other's smiling faces, but until then, I hope that you can see me smiling with my eyes! The Diaconate is continuing to look towards the future, and plan activities where we might be together again with some kind of normalcy, so hang in there, we hear you, and we care! 
