

From the Desk of Pastor Kelly

I spent most of Monday gathering with clergy and lay leaders from across ABCOPAD (American Baptist Churches of PA & DE). We dedicated our time to designing our 2020 biennial leadership conference. It is going to be a very beneficial time, centering around encouraging people from different generations to "see" one another – noting the value each brings to the work of seeing Jesus' Kingdom come today!

I found our primary task energizing and fruitful. Yet I found some of the stories shared across our table draining. Why? Because they were about churches that absolutely refused to fix their eyes on Jesus and to view His Bride through His eyes. Pastors told stories of congregations comprised almost exclusively of Builders & Baby Boomers who ran off Millennials & Gen Z (those born from 1980-2000 & 2000-now, respectively) because their kids made noise or they did not dress according to unwritten codes. Others recounted churches where those in their middle-age years and younger all but wrote off those who were older, acting as if they had nothing to learn from people who express their love for the Lord differently than their generations. They spoke of churches that were more deeply invested in *tradition* than *truth*, *preference* than *purpose*, and their *club* than the *Church*.

Those stories were all from this year. Several of those churches no longer exist.

While it was saddening to listen, those same stories drove me to my knees in thanks and in need. They made me rejoice with our Father about how hard we work to be one body bound together by one faith. It made me celebrate the way our music ministry crosses generational lines. I thanked Jesus for how both the Searchers classroom on Sunday mornings and our Young Adult living rooms on Friday evenings fill to capacity. Both groups gather to believe and belong; they do so in different ways, and neither takes away from the other. And I found myself calling upon the Spirit to continue the work of creating mentoring relationships that bridge age gaps, as those a bit farther on their journey with Christ help ones coming on the road to pursue Him.

Those same stories also made me pray. It's hard to do church together. It's tough to put 5 generations together in the same space. It's difficult sometimes to truly see one another as people made in God's image, loved by the Savior, and filled by the Spirit. And it's completely, totally worth it, because it is completely, totally God's design.

Thank you for continuing to trust that we who believe the Gospel belong with one another.

From Pastor Greg

Growing up, I remember being captivated by stories of heroic Christian martyrs. Men and women with other-worldly courage, doing great works for God, and then dying a horrific death, all while never losing an ounce of faith. A protestant man being burned at the stake for his declaration that justification was by faith alone; and even while his skin shriveled, belting out hymns with such exuberance that onlookers, taken aback by his faith, were converted on the spot. That sort of thing. I so greatly admired the faith, courage, and all-out commitment of these saints of the past that I unwittingly began to place those who experienced extreme persecution or accomplished much for the Lord in a more "spiritual" category than the rest of us normal Christians. I esteemed and idealized this manner of living the Christian life so much that it was almost as if I was doing something wrong, or at least spiritually inferior, if I was not in perpetual danger of being waterboarded, burned at the stake, or thrown to starving lions. And I don't believe I'm alone in thinking of the Christian life this way. I believe most of us are inclined to think in a similar fashion.

For instance, we all tend to place vocations into spiritually ranked categories. We might not ever say it, but we've determined that being a nurse in Haiti is somehow spiritually superior to being an electrician in Mechanicsburg. Using your law degree to fight sex trafficking in China is spiritually superior to using it to reform property law in Camp Hill. And being a pastor is spiritually superior to being a plumber. That's why pastors, not plumbers, are always asked to pray at dinner, pray at board meetings, pray at lunches, pray at business meetings, pray at potlucks, and pray at every other event where there could possibly be prayer. After all, what else are pastors but professional Christians? The point is, we so often subconsciously divide Christians into more-spiritual and less-spiritual categories and venerate the Christian whose life is more 'exciting.'

The Bible, however, does no such thing. Rather, Scripture repeatedly commands Christians to live normal, quiet lives (1 Tim. 2:2, 1 Thess. 4:11). In other words, doing 'great' things for the Lord often probably looks less like nailing theses to doors and more like minding your own business and not causing too much of a fuss, less like being burned at the stake while belting out hymns and more like careful Bible study with an obediently humble heart, less like being mauled by lions and more like a grateful spirit and a committed prayer life. Granted, nailing a thesis, being burned at the stake, and being mauled by lions for acts of faith are not inherently bad things at all, but they also should not be presented as normal or more spiritual – and definitely not as necessary components of a faithful Christian life. The faithful Christian life, as the Bible portrays it, is not marked primarily by bold, public declarations of faith, but by characteristics such as quietness, love, humility, sober-mindedness, a smallness in one's own mind, meekness, joy, patience, an others-centeredness, love for God's word, peace, prayerfulness, slowness to speak, gentleness, a quickness to repent, and self-control – to name just a few. Let us strive to become Christians who put away notions of false piety and yearn to love God, live faithfully, die well, and be forgotten.
